



Apple's iPad has grown in use with the disabled population, especially children who find the device relatively easy to use. There have been an abundance of apps created that aid in communication, offer visual schedules, increase vocabulary and reading comprehension, create social stories, share interactive books, play musical instruments, etc. All of this is possible without any modifications or adaptations, which also increases the independence of the individual with a disability.

An article written in the New York Times in October 2010 introduced readers to a 7 year old boy with cerebral palsy who did not have the ability to maneuver a mouse on a computer, but could point to the touch screen on the iPad. This enabled him to interact with different apps that allowed him to communicate, listen to music, and practice math facts. The cost of an iPad is less expensive than other devices developed and marketed to individuals with disabilities. The price of the apps varies, some are even free. Verbally by Intuary

Verbally is an easy-to-use, comprehensive Augmentative and Alternative Communication (AAC) app for the iPad. Verbally brings speech to those without and enables real conversation with its simple, intuitive design. Just tap in what you want to say and Verbally speaks for you.



Autism XPress by Studio Emotion

This app gives facial expressions of different emotions for use with expressing feelings. In addition to encouraging people with autism to express their emotions, this app also promotes awareness about autism spectrum disorders.



ArtikPix by RinnApps

An articulation app with flashcard and matching activities for individuals with speech sound delays. Students can collect data as they practice sounds with a speech-language pathologist, parents, or independently.



First Then Visual Schedule by Good Karma Apps

First-Then Visual Schedule application is designed for caregivers to provide positive behavior support for those with communication needs. This application provides an affordable and convenient audio-visual prompting tool for use on the iPhone or iTouch, making it perfect for use at school, home, or in the community.



Grace App by Steven-Troughton Smith

A simple picture exchange system developed by and for non-verbal people allowing the user to communicate their needs by building sentences from relevant images. It can be customized by the individual using their picture and photo vocabulary with the user taking and saving pictures independently to the app.



iCommunicate by Grembe

Create pictures, flashcards, storyboards, routines, and visual schedules. Record custom audio in any language. This app includes 100+ pictures (first 5 have audio) to get you started. Add pictures with your camera, or from your camera roll, or use Google image search. Utilize as audio visual prompting tool or AAC device.



iConverse by Xcellent Creations

Displays 6 different icons that represent a person's basic needs. When touched, the icons give both an auditory and visual representation of the specific need.



Prologue2go: AAC in Your Pocket by AssistiveWare

Provides a full-featured communication solution for people who have difficulty speaking. It uses natural sounding text to speech voices, up to date symbols, and a vocabulary of over 7000 items.



Living Safely by AbleLink Technologies, Inc.

Provides self-directed learning sessions for 27 important safety skills topics based on proven content developed by the Attainment Company. Living Safely is specifically designed to be used directly by individuals with autism, learning, or other developmental disabilities at their own pace.
